MAYA'S STORY

A Touching Story of Hope and Empathy

Battling a rare form of cancer known as rhabdomyosarcoma, 11-year-old Maya understandably felt upset and angry, and her peers and teachers could see it. Like Maya's peers and teachers, the CISofHR Site Coordinator, Janae Boone, also noticed Maya's anger and acting out.

To develop a relationship with Maya, CISofHR Site Coordinator Janae created an environment wherein Maya felt safe in expressing her wide ranging feelings. Gradually, Maya began to open up and shared her fears of her cancer spreading and pointed out her swollen lymph nodes as they grew on her body. Frequently reassuring Maya that cancer did not have to control her life, Janae encouraged Maya to stay positive. As their relationship grew, Maya excitedly shared that she had noticed her hair starting to grow back after chemotherapy! With the support and encouragement of her CISofHR Site Coordinator Janae, Maya made a conscious decision to remain positive. Maya's optimistic outlook began to take shape, and she started smiling and laughing more. As a result, instead of being known for her anger, Maya now makes a positive impact on the people around her and is known as a sweet girl with an inspiring attitude.

Empathy and support in the face of adversity have transformative power. By simply listening to and encouraging Maya, CISofHR Site Coordinator Janae impacted Maya's life beyond the textbook. Maya maintains a positive outlook despite her difficult circumstances. Maya has learned that opening up and sharing her fears and concerns with a confidente can provide a sense of comfort and hope. With that comfort and hope, Maya finds the strength to stay positive and not let cancer define her.

Instead of being a distraction to her peers and teachers in school and instead of being distracted herself by her fears, Maya's improved demeanor and outlook allow her to continue to learn and grow like her peers.



JUAN'S STORY

How a Board Member's Network Makes a Difference for Juan and His Family

Every student's fundamental needs—food, shelter, personal hygiene items—should be met. Unfortunately, oftentimes the students CISofHR encounters do not have these basic needs met by their caregivers.

During the 2021-22 school year, Juan missed 62 days of school, so in 2022-23, the CISofHR Site Coordinator Hallie Baumgardner developed a relationship with Juan to help him with his attendance. In those attendance goal setting meetings, CISofHR Site Coordinator Hallie recognized that Juan's personal hygiene was not being appropriately managed. She further learned that Juan's family had been without electricity and water in their home for several months and that Juan was not coming to school regularly because he was being teased for his poor hygiene. After connecting the family with resources to restore their electricity and water service, Hallie turned to her Hygiene Closet sponsored by Next Generation Home Care. CISofHR Site Coordinator Hallie gave Juan the needed items and arranged for Juan to take a hygiene kit home to his family monthly.

Thanks to the efforts of CISofHR Board Member Marko Frigelj, PMA IT Solutions' Mickayla Brandly, and CISofHR Site Coordinator Shinita Jenkins, each CISofHR Site Coordinator maintains a Hygiene Closet at the school they serve. Ms. Jenkins expressed to her mentor, Mr. Frigelj, that her students were in need of hygiene supplies and the effect the lack thereof had on attendance and confidence. Mr. Frigelj went to work reaching out to his personal and business contacts seeking sponsors for CISofHR Hygiene Closets. Within a couple of months, the Hygiene Closets were up and running and being refilled by the community partner when supplies dwindled.

With the support of the following community partners, students like Juan have access to toothpaste, toothbrushes, grooming supplies, deodorant, soap, lotion, feminine hygiene items, and much more. This access made a difference for Juan and other students who would otherwise struggle with being bullied, embarrassment, shame, concentration, and even school attendance. CISofHR THANKS YOU!

ATTENDANCE

Throughout the academic year, the Site Coordinators in Hampton Roads are instrumental in helping local schools to achieve success. School attendance is crucial for individual success, and CISofHR Site Coordinators work tirelessly to organize and execute school-wide events, like ice cream socials, to motivate students to attend school regularly. CISofHR Site Coordinators also work individually with their case-managed students employing innovative approaches to address students' individual and unique challenges that are keeping students from attending school regularly.

BEHAVIORS

Behaving in school is vital for academic achievement. Largely, student behaviors are symptoms of deeper social-emotional issues, so CISofHR Site Coordinators are experienced in identifying when certain behaviors arise from something deeper. CISofHR Site Coordinators work with students on identifying and communicating their feelings, general communication skills, anger management, and conflict resolution skills. CISofHR Site Coordinators partner with local counselors and mental health providers who work with students in small groups and individually providing mentoring, developing student self-esteem, and addressing deeper mental health issues. As students learn to be aware of their behavior and then moderate it to the situation, they get in trouble less, attend both school and class more frequently, and are positioned to learn.

COURSE PERFORMANCE

By participating in class, completing assignments on time, and developing good study habits, students increase their chances of achieving higher grades and developing a positive attitude towards learning. CISofHR connects students with in-school tutoring services, offering one-on-one attention and guidance tailored to the students' specific needs, that results in a deeper understanding of the material and improved grades. CISofHR Site Coordinators work with students in developing time management skills, responsibility, and self-discipline. These skills benefit students in future academic and professional pursuits.

In addition to offering academic support, CISofHR Site Coordinators engage their students with activities and supports centered upon career exploration, career planning, and college application and testing support. Through partnerships with the Don Carey REECH Foundation and the Boule' Scholars, CISofHR students from middle school through high school learn about careers in the culinary arts, Fortune 500 companies, and governmental research facilities. CISofHR students use these experiences to inform their decisions regarding post-graduation plans.


DONOR APPRECIATION


